A Celebration of the Magnificent Life of Linda Ann Kunz



Jan. 18, 1940 - Dec. 21, 2009

Linda Ann Kunz (January 18, 1940 – December 21, 2009) will be remembered for her boundless energy, keen imagination, great generosity and neverending zest for life. She grew up in Hempstead, Long Island, but it was at SUNY New Paltz that the Linda we all knew was born. In the 1960s, early in her forty-eight year teaching career, she taught in a small village in Kenya, often traveling down the mountain on weekends to sing in a nightclub at the beach. Later, she taught Peace Corps Volunteers. But it was when Linda was working on her Master's Degree in Teaching English as a Second Language at Teachers College, Columbia University, that her life's passion began: She studied Sector Analysis with Dr. Robert L. Allen.

She became expert in this grammar, which led to her becoming known internationally for her books, articles and workshops on X-Word Grammar [http://xwordgrammar.pbworks.com/]. Linda's love of grammar and her passion teaching ESL students to write were unparalleled. She went on to become an influential long-time teacher of ESL and teacher trainer. She taught graduate students—future ESL teachers—at NYU and she also taught undergraduates at CUNY in The English Language Center at LaGuardia Community College (1981 – 2009), at Hunter (1972 – 1981), York, Lehman, John Jay and Baruch. She studied Aesthetic Realism, which informed her teaching for over 35 years. In the 1990s, she received her Ed.D. in Applied Linguistics at Teachers College. As a tribute to her outstanding career of five decades she was given special recognition posthumously on March 16 as part of the 2010 New York Times ESOL Teacher of the Year Award.

But the Linda we know and love was so much more than all of that. She was the Linda who fought to abolish the death penalty. She was the Linda who loved sailing on the Long Island Sound and watching birds in Central Park. She was the Linda who loved to travel and to curl up with her cat Jimmy and read *The New York Times*. She was the Linda who loved to go to a good restaurant with friends and would fight with you for the bill. She was the Linda who loved to talk about Darwin or what she had read in the *Times* or seen in a movie, a play, or on *House*. She was the Linda who loved to sit down at the piano and just play for hours. She was the Linda who had each of us feel loved, who is so alive, and who will live forever in our memories.
